CLASSICAL EDUCATION FOR MODERN STUDENTS

Classical education seeks to train the WHOLE person (intellectual, moral, spiritual, emotional, and physical) to recognize, embrace, communicate, and defend all that is **True**, **Good**, and **Beautiful** (the three Transcendental Virtues), not merely to memorize and regurgitate facts without discernment.

Upper School students at NCCS are provided with a survey of history from Creation to the present TWICE, each time with different, **developmentally appropriate** standards.

Each of the humanities subjects have been *carefully designed* to correlate with one another, providing a **richer experience** and **fuller understanding** of the ideas and impacts of each era on the present.

All classes are taught at an **honors** level, yet are accessible to the average student, using **primary source** materials, the **Great Books**, and timeless **interactive** teaching methods to bring the people, events, and ideas of history to life!

Similarly, our math and science classes aim to instruct our students in the principles of creation so lovingly foreordained by the same God who predestined the works of history. These are taught through exploration, experimentation, memorization, and analysis, so that students are actually using the skills they acquire in their liberal arts courses. Students cannot afford to compartmentalize subjects, divorcing art from science or math from history. These studies all serve the same God, and so deserve the time and attention of each student throughout his life of study.

Rhetoric instruction begins well before the Rhetoric stage, focusing on analytic and communication skills that our students learned in the Grammar stage. Beginning with formal Logic and writing courses, our students learn that knowledge and information alone are not enough to convince anyone, but rather crafted and beautiful conversation that persuades and wins arguments.

Fine Arts: Building Better Worshippers

Students in the Grammar stage primarily study the arts by **imitating the masters** of western art, learning the principles of art and style, and imitating the language of music they hear all around them.

Following years of instruction through imitation, Upper School students develop skills through larger pieces, group performance, and experimentation.

Instruction weekly, mastering the most important instrument God gave them. Students also work on studio pieces in art class, taking extra time to craft their own creative expressions of the Beauty they see in creation.

Musical and artistic projects are chosen to reflect the time periods students study in history and literature, exploring each artistic movement every year.
